


# Land Access and Weapon Discharge Regulations Per Maine General Hunting Regulations and Town Ordinances for the Town of Bar Harbor, Maine

**Deer Hunting Would Be ...**

- Not Allowed (State/Federal Reg) - 13,364 acres (49%)
- Not Allowed (Local Ordinance) - 783 acres (3%)
- Landowner Permission/Discharge Specifications Required - 6,150 acres (23%)
- Access/Discharge Allowed Unless Posted - 6,658 acres (25%)

**Public Roads**

- Primary (no hunting)
- Secondary (no hunting)
- Improved (no hunting)
- Unimproved

**APPLICABLE REGULATIONS (Maine general hunting provisions 2013-2014)**

- No hunting in Acadia National Park
- No shooting from or over a public paved road or within 10 feet of the pavement
- No shooting within 100 yards of a building or residential dwelling without permission from the owner
- No discharge of a firearm or crossbow within 500 feet of public school property

**LOCAL ORDINANCE (No Discharge Area) - code Chapter 81-2A**  
 Beginning at a point at low water mark due east of the intersection of Main Street and Schooner Head Road, thence following in a direct line to the intersection of Main Street and Schooner Head Road, thence following Main Street to the intersection of Main Street and Cromwell Harbor Road, thence following Cromwell Harbor Road to the intersection of Eagle Lake Road, thence following Eagle Lake Road to the intersection of Cleftstone Road, thence northerly following Cleftstone Road and the easterly boundary line of Acadia National Park to Duck Brook, thence following Duck Brook easterly to the high water mark of Frenchman Bay

**NOTES:**

- The data used for building and residential dwelling set backs may include buildings that don't require a set back (see the state hunting regulations).
- The buffer for buildings was created using data from the town assessor's office which accounts for buildings through August 2008 and points for new houses April 2008 through April 2009.
- Public paved roads were assumed to be 20 feet wide and a buffer was applied to 10 feet on both sides (the public paved roads were buffered 20 feet on each side of the centerline for calculating acreages).
- All water areas (ocean, bays, lakes, and ponds) were excluded from acreage figures.
